#### The Vestry, October 2016

For many people, this is the time of year when the perfect Christmas appears. Well, at least it seem that way in some gifts and images. You know the ones I mean... on calendars and Christmas cards where we find the perfectly airbrushed Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus. Flawlessly clean, not a speck of dust or dirt, no sign of Mary exhausted nor baby Jesus with colic. No sign either of worry from Joseph wondering how he was going to provide and we know this image of perfection is not quite right. Many other people may be taken in by the hymn writers' idyllic ideas of the sweetly sleeping infant, 'little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes.' Really?



Rather like the peculiar relationships between those who want everything and those who struggle to provide everything, something feels wrong. For many youngsters, it has to be the perfect gift, the latest Wii game or iPhone to gain the right social standing and youngsters absolutely adore those who provide such gifts. But, does that make for lasting relationships?

The wonder of the miracle of Christmas is that God came down to dwell among us, to live as one of us, to give us great hope in the wonderful relationship that we can have with Jesus in life eternal. Some may find it peculiar that Jesus lived for thirty years or so, and also that many people who knew him had personal encounters with him and strangely, they never made it into the Bible stories. Yet, the crowds 'marvelled' at the things he said and did as their lives changed forever.

If only we could break free of the stereotypical images, free from the airbrushed Christmas, we might realise that our habitual interpretations of the Christmas story could be swamped with the wrong gifts. We are reminded of the overpowering sense of wonder and sheer delightful gratitude that comes when we realise that, imperfections and all, we are part of the crowd that marvels at Jesus. You and I are neither spotless, pure or holy, but rather like those who knew Jesus two thousand years ago, we are invited to come and meet the Christ Child just as we are. Marvellous!

#### Greetings from your soon to be Student Minister.

Rev Erskine has asked me to share a few words of introduction to give you some background of how I came to this point.

'The Church of Scotland will be holding an Enquirer's Course for those who would be interested in working for the Church...so if anyone feels called to do so, or is just interested in exploring that, it is being held in...' Each time I heard this announcement, my attention was caught, to the extent I can remember exactly where I was sitting, and thought, 'I wonder how you would know if you should go to that?'

Now as a second year Candidate in Training for Full-time Ministry of Word and Sacrament, with The Church of Scotland, I have learned exactly how you know if you should go to that. If God wants you to take action, He reveals Himself, in all sorts of ways, and thankfully He gives the strength to execute His exciting plans. 'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.' Jeremiah 29:11. Although not without challenges along the way, in transferring from 27 years of teaching, at Buckhaven Primary School, to becoming a full-time student, at the University of St Andrews, these words have become very close to my heart, as I journey in ministry.

I asked God, 'Is there anything else you want me to do for you?' I felt confident in my request, because in the 'big' transitions in my life, God had always clearly shown, with His perfect timing, when and where 'new beginnings' should take place, e.g. studying in Aberdeen, teaching in Buckhaven, teaching in Greenwich, Connecticut, USA, becoming an elder and visiting Lusangazi, Malawi, to name but a few. Training to become a minister has proven to be no different, with excellent placement experiences in Kirkcaldy Presbytery, in the congregations of Auchtertool linked with Linktown, and St Bryce Kirk. I also had the great privilege of working with different denominations, from June to August, this year, by sharing a wonderful ten-week summer placement with the First Congregational Church, in Rockport, MA, in the United States and was 'on loan' for a week to the First Baptist Church of Rockport, for their Vacation Bible School. I believe these experiences in my journey with Jesus, family, friends and colleagues, are all part of the wonderful life tapestry that God creates for each one of us. Experiences of high and lower points, and not without bumps in the road along the way. Such joy to know He walks with us through every one of these experiences, whether or not we understand the plan.

I am excited to be joining the ministry team, and sharing in the life of the congregation of Markinch and Thornton. As we meet together to worship and pray, listening to the 'still small voice of God' in all that we do, I believe He will have great plans for all of us, as we grow together to bring glory to Him. I leave you with these hymn words, which sum up my journey in ministry. 'All that I am, all I can be, all that I have, all that is me. Accept and use Lord, as you would choose Lord. Right now today.' (William Himes) 'I'll go in the strength of the Lord, in paths he has marked for my feet.' (Edward Turney). I look forward to walking that path with you.

#### Why Pray?

"Prayer is the human response to the perpetual outpouring of love by which God lays siege to every soul." *Richard Foster.* 

Why does prayer come so easily to some and not to others?

The Prayer Vision of the Church of Scotland, Mission and Discipleship is that the people of Scotland, in all its parts, may hear clearly the gospel of Jesus Christ, see the life of His Spirit among His people and come to know the love of God the Father.

Consider it then a privilege to be in a position where you can help and lead others into a deeper communion with God through the gift of intercession.

Let us have confidence, then, and approach God's throne, where there is grace. There we will receive mercy and find grace to help us just when we need it. Hebrews 4:16

So, why pray? We pray because of the example of our Lord Jesus Christ who taught his disciples to pray (Matthew 6:5-14), he offered prayer to his Father for himself, for the disciples and for the church, (John 17), and, Jesus took time out to pray (Luke 6:12). "Pray on every occasion as the Spirit leads..." (Ephesians 6:18).

Prayer, therefore, is the channel through which we love, seek justice and strive for peace. As a church family, when we gather in prayer as part of corporate worship, we reaffirm the resurrection power of Easter. Prayer is absolutely central to our journey of faith with our risen Lord. (Acts 2:44-47)

Isn't it astonishing that God, the Creator of all things, wants us to build a personal relationship with him through Jesus by the mystery of prayer?

Prayer is the conversation that underpins that relationship and is a dialogue that is both speaking and listening.

In 1984, the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland passed this deliverance; "Instruct Presbyteries to appoint Prayer Co-ordinators, and to encourage the appointment of Congregational Prayer Promoters", with the remit to, "The development of prayer in the life of individual members, congregations and Presbytery."

Within Markinch and Thornton Church, Jean Kane is our Prayer Promoter. Each individual Kirk Session is responsible for appointing a **Prayer Promoter** and, at present **we are seeking people to join our prayer group.** What would it involve? Simply developing prayer within all aspects of the congregation and community. Helping people to understand that prayer could be an active and normal part of life, organising opportunities for people to gather to pray and to learn more about prayer and, to convince people that prayer works!

What kind of qualities are we looking for in those who might join the prayer group? People firm in their own faith, of good listening ability, sensitive to people, held in respect by others, able to hold people's confidence and most importantly, encourage others to pray.

#### Prisoners Week, 20th - 27th November 2016

His name is not known, his words have never been forgotten. One of the prisoners on a nearby cross calls out to Jesus, "Remember me".

Prisoners Week is an initiative of the Churches that aims to stimulate discussion, highlight concerns and share hope, in prisons and communities across Scotland. It takes place in the third week of November and offers a time to



remember all who are affected by crime: people in prison, people who have been hurt by the actions of others, those who work in prison, families and the wider communities in which we live.

The National Launch Service for Prisoners Week will take place at 18:30 on Monday 21st November in St Margaret's, Drip Road, Stirling FK9 4UA, followed by refreshments. The Service is ecumenical and all are welcome. Local community and prison events also celebrate the week. There are many kinds of prison, not only the ones with high fences, cameras, bars and locks. People can feel trapped by circumstances, pressurised by demands, locked down by fear and limited by lack of opportunity.

Maybe the prisoner's cry voices something we all want, to be thought of from time to time, to be seen as the person we are, to be remembered.

Prisoners Week is a time to remember all who are affected by crime: people in prison, people who have been hurt by the actions others, those who work in prison, families and the wider communities in which we live.

You are remembered even if you are behind a locked door.

You are remembered in prayer because we understand it still hurts.

You are remembered for your patience and care.

If this brief encounter is anything to go by then we can remember too that forgiveness can be received, healing can begin and we can have a better future.

## PRAYER FOR THOSE WHO DON'T DO CHURCH



Our Kirk Session recently agreed that we could launch this event but we needed to raise funds to buy the booklets and banners and so we had intended to hold a coffee morning. However, to our delight and surprise, someone kindly donated these funds so that the booklets could be given out before Christmas.

Trypraying is the work of a traffic planner, a shop manager, a writer, a designer, an entrepreneur, a civil engineer and others.

A conversation on a train went like this. The guy in his 20s was asked, "Do you ever pray?" His reply was, "Yes. I prayed for two people who were seriously ill. One died and the other got better." He concluded he'd had 50% success.

This reflex – the desire to reach out to God – is basic to many, many people. Trypraying is a resource for people like that: no church connection or interest, but open to find out about God. The trypraying booklet is a 7-day prayer guide and is now being used by many to pass on to friends and family with a few words of encouragement – 'Why don't you try praying for a week and see what happens in your life?' Use it and then lose it somewhere that someone else will find it and hopefully use it too.

Trypraying contains stories of answered prayer, ideas of things to do, important themes about how to connect with god and honest prayers. It is an outrageous exposure to the grace and power of God. It's an invitation to start a conversation with God over seven days. Each day is composed of four parts. Read something to get you thinking. Read a story of someone sharing how prayer worked in their life. Think about some wise words then, pray.

There is a place to write your big issue. A place where some common questions are answered, and some bright ideas that might help you to try praying. At the end of the 7 days you have the opportunity to go further and pray some more. You can also contact us at trypraying for help.

Special tributes were given by his dear friends, the Rev Dr Angus Allan and the Rev Alex Forsyth. The Moderator of the Presbytery of Kirkcaldy, the Rev Andrew Donald was in attendance as were many colleagues in ministry, family and friends.

Throughout his Ministry, David shared in peoples' everyday lives so easily because he was so approachable, so easy to talk to. This remarkable gentleman was quiet and unassuming but full of warmth and good humour through his ministry of preaching, praying and for all that he accomplished through weddings, baptisms, services of communion and funerals.

David died peacefully on the 8th September 2016. We recall the strong faith that he lived through the conviction that never left him, the conviction that God wills unity, reconciliation, justice and peace, and those things are at the heart of the Gospel.

Those who remember David have all been richly blessed by their association with him. We extend our deepest sympathy and assure Jeanie and the family of our prayerful remembrance. Truly David was a shining example walking in the footsteps of our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### A CHRISTMAS CHALLENGE - Do You Hear What I Hear...

Christmas is on a Sunday this year and because we are a family church, we can *joyfully* remind one another that whatever plans we make for Christmas, they should be made around worshipping God with our church and community family. In short, Christmas means that we are reminded to bring our focus to where it belongs. Sometimes, we don't do that very well, especially when it comes to the time and place realities of faith. So...

"Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another - and all the more as you see the Day approaching. (Hebrews 10:24-25)

Church attendance is a matter of indifference to some people because they think that they can worship God anywhere, anytime. Some feel they are not missing anything if they don't make church on a particular Sunday, or on Christmas Day. Many people make excuses not to attend and many more will be visiting, or working, so it just won't be convenient to be at church on Christmas Day.

Tears have been trickling, brows have been furrowed and many people have been 'tweeting' over the controversial decisions of some churches cancelling their worship service on Christmas Day to allow members to spend that time with their families. Someone said that having a service on Christmas Day, "Would not be the most effective use of staff and volunteer resources." Another said, "If our target and our mission is to reach the un-churched how likely is it that they'll be going to church on Christmas morning?" Since the doors of their church will be closed? Not very likely!

From the standpoint of efficiency and the effective use of resources, perhaps churches choosing to cancel Christmas services have made that decision for themselves. I struggle with that because efficiency is not the point. If we feel cannot find room for worship in our crowded schedules, then perhaps it's because we've forgotten that **our schedule is not God's schedule**. If we don't have a valid excuse, or time for worship on Christmas Day, then perhaps we ought to rethink our definition of how we spend the time our God given time.

I know that many people are not trying to exclude Jesus from Christmas just as surely as I know that every Christian who gathers for worship that day is doing so out of a desire to include him. But, I feel that decisions about how we spend our time on Christmas Day really matters. I know that we can worship God anywhere, anytime, but, I also know that not going to church doesn't necessarily equal worship.

Christmas calls us to celebrate Christ becoming human and living among us while waiting in expectation for him to come again. One of the ways we wait in expectation is to join together for worship and encourage one another.

Services here before Christmas are all busy services. So, a church that is open is certainly not a waste of time. It can be efficient for those who are churched, de-churched and un-churched, where ever people are in their journey of faith, ALL ARE WELCOME.

So I will be at church on Christmas morning at Thornton and I can't think of a better way to celebrate Christ's birth while sharpening my anticipation for his return than to meet with his people to worship the Lord, the One to whom we answer and of the One who gives our lives purpose through his Son, our Lord, our Saviour, Jesus Christ.


#### **Book Review by Grant Taylor**

One hundred cardinal's get together to choose a new pope in a deft tale of Vatican intrigue

A conclave of cardinals charged with choosing a new pope after the incumbent dies seems to fit this tradition nicely. The men are locked in a chapel within the Vatican to cast the series of ballots that leads to the selection of a new pope

and the puff of white smoke from a chimney. Even the word conclave itself, from the Latin clavis, or key, suggests confinement. There is one difficulty. Cardinals are not obvious crime suspects, so a mystery set in a conclave has a flaw. Where there should be deception, violence, even death, instead there is a group of devoted men who keep on praying to God to be guided by the Holy Spirit. That, at least, is the idea. The picture of the Church that emerges is wholly persuasive, with the liberals and conservatives slugging it out from what they consider the best of motives.

Until, that is, the final and biggest twist of all which, for my money, is pitched somewhere between the entirely unconvincing and the hopelessly silly.



#### The Kohima Epitaph

When Armistice Day, November 11th, is observed, and Armistice Services are held on Remembrance Sunday, November 13th, many people will hear the words of the Kohima Epitaph;

When you go home, tell them of us and say, For their tomorrow, we gave our today.

These words were originally attributed to John Maxwell Edmonds, and became famous after being inscribed on the Kohima Memorial in India. They are a poignant tribute to all those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for their nation, in war or conflict, in any part of the world. Often, the third line will read 'For your tomorrow'.

This month marks the centenary of General Douglas Haig ordering the ending of the Battle of the Somme, on November 18th, a Battle which saw over one million casualties, dead, wounded, or missing, from the Allied and German Armies, from its commencement on July 1st, 1916. The territory which the Allies gained in the battle is marked now by innumerable Cemeteries and Monuments, for casualties of both sides, where people can look for the grave, or name, of a deceased relative, or simply visit the ground over which one of their family fought one hundred years ago. We have visited many of these, over the years, and returned home to tell people of them, just as John Edmonds wrote would happen.

It was very interesting to read, this weekend, articles in the Raith Rovers F.C. programme for the match v Queen of the South. Marshall Bowman tells his story of the visit to Contalmaison this year for the Centenary, and of some of the cemeteries which his group, from McCrae's Battalion Trust, visited, paying tribute to men connected to East of Scotland football clubs, including Raith Rovers and Dunfermline Athletic, and coming home to tell of them now. Davie Hancock also has an article, about his cycle journey to Contalmaison for the same Centenary. Thanks to Jane O'Harrow for bringing me a copy of the programme so that I could read it.

Markinch and Thornton lost many men in 'The Great War'. Markinch has 85 names on the Town Memorial, Thornton has 40 with their name on the Memorial at Memorial Park, and, between the two, is Coaltown of Balgonie, with 22 on the Memorial there. Some of the casualties typify the 'Pals Battalions' which became synonymous with the War, but not in every instance. Markinch has casualties from Scottish, Australian, Canadian and U.S.A. Regiments, and the R.A.F.. The majority of the names on the Coaltown Memorial record the Black Watch as the Regiment, as did Markinch, and in Thornton there are 10 from the Black Watch, and 10 from K.O.S.B., with English, Irish, Canadian, and Australian involvement also recorded, and so the 'pals battalions' theme is there. Indeed, three from Thornton were drivers with R.A.S.C..

During the summer, the idea of laying a Wreath at the Menin Gate on Armistice Day, at the Last Post Ceremony, on behalf of the Church, suddenly came to me, and the idea was approved by the Kirk Session.



The website www.lastpost.be has a section for Ceremonies, and there it lists the participants for each daily Service. Included on the list of participants for Armistice Day is Markinch and Thornton Parish Church, so people who read the Ceremony Calendar at the Menin Gate, or who check on the website, www.lastpost.be, will find the name, and hopefully some of them will refer to the Church website when they have the opportunity to do so.

At this time, thanks should be expressed to Gordon Michie, who was of great assistance in getting a wreath, with inscription, from Poppy Scotland in Edinburgh.

We remember with thanksgiving
those who lived and died
in the service of our country.
In honesty of heart,
we seek the Lord's renewing grace
to deepen wisdom and heal memories
with peace that echoes eternity.




#### **Christmas Teas**
